The bon-bon sweets were replaced by novelty gifts and in 1900, Thomas's two sons, who took over the business after Thomas died, decided to add the paper hats as well. It wasn't until late in the 1930's when

the 'love' poems were replaced by jokes and limericks.

Story of St. Dominics

Originally a convent and convalescence home, St. Dominics was ran by nuns, led by Sister Mary. The home had 17 residential rooms and 2 extra bedrooms for visitors. Because money was tight, the nuns had to buy Army reject furniture for the rooms and also had the rooms painted Army Green! The vegetable garden (now the staff car-park) was huge, and they had to employ three gardeners to maintain the garden, and the nuns sold the vegetables to the local community. There was a tin hut (where our quiet room and long corridor is) known as the Guild Room, and this was hired out to villagers for parties and meetings. It was later turned into a pre-school. In 1994, the nuns retired, and Mr. Banning and Mr & Mrs Warwick bought St. Dominics.

In 1995, four additional rooms were added to the bungalow section of the building, and Sister Mary was invited to officially open this for us. Mr. Banning remembers; Sister Mary drove down from up north with another nun. Sister Mary loved her wine and even though she was driving back up the M1, she still had a few wines on the occasion!

More building work took place a couple of years later when the upper floor (rooms 32 to 39) was added. During the summer of 1998, the roof over rooms 1 to 7 had to be removed, so the residents had to vacate their rooms. Where did they go? You might ask! Mr Banning brought porta cabins into the grounds for the residents to stay in whilst the work was going on. Unfortunately, it rained for 2-3 weeks solid whilst the roof was off! Mr Banning recalls Sheila, the manager at the time, wearing her wellington boots to wade through the corridor to the laundry room! The residents, however, absolutely loved the fact that they were staying in porta cabins – some said it was like being on a camping holiday. There was a dog called Snoopy in the convent that used to be driven in the car by a little Irish nun Sister Mary Dymphna, who was a terrible driver! So much so, that people thought Snoopy was driving! Snoopy stayed on in St. Dominics, sleeping by one of the resident's bed upstairs. The pre-school moved to another part of the village in 2007, and was then demolished to make way for yet another extension. By now, St. Dominics was really growing and had become an established residential home in Kelvedon.

St. Dominics now has 39 rooms and employs 52 members of staff, and are also privilege to have volunteers such as June, Gloria, Margaret, Amy, Sarah, Nuffy the dog, and not to forget Anne and her PAT dog Lily. The home has gone from strength to strength over the years, engaging in many events within the community, as well as enjoying many activities within the home.

Our Heroes of St. Dominics

This is the time of year that we are reminded to think of others, and I'd like to remind you to think of our "unsung heroes" of St. Dominics who also care for our residents. Where would we be without our housekeepers Pauline, Christine, Karen, and Sam who keeps your rooms clean and smelling fresh, our laundry lady Linda who lovingly irons your clothes each day. Our maintenance men Tom and Andy who keep our garden tidy, and also keep St. Dominics in good working order! Not forgetting our kitchen staff: Carol, Lee, Jeff and Ciel, who provide us with excellent tasty meals each day. Our administrator Nicole who sits so quietly in the corner upstairs drowned by mountains of paperwork making sure that we get our wages in the bank on time! Assistant Administrator Gill, who is forever running around looking for me! Last but not least, will you all join me to thank our Home Manager Jean Dolmor, her 'elves' Tracy and Lisa, and, of course, our carers who have helped make St. Dominics such a charming, warm, inviting, vibrant place to live and work at. Finally, I personally would like to thank all the residents, families, staff and our volunteers for their help and support that I have received over the past year during activities, events, and outings.
